

DIRECTORS' MESSAGE

The mandate of the Moose Jaw Museum & Art Gallery is the true measure of all that we do. Through it, we are directed to preserve and promote the culture and history of Moose Jaw and area. While keeping our eyes on this directive, we continue our practice of providing professional, challenging and evocative exhibitions of art and history to the viewing public.

Throughout 2014, we continued our long-standing tradition of collaboration with colleagues. On the local, provincial, and national levels, we worked with organizations like Moose Jaw YMCA, Moose Jaw Multicultural Council, Hunger in Moose Jaw, and a wide variety of businesses within the community in our educational and fundraising programs.

This year, however, we extended our collaboration when we received funding from the Saskatchewan Arts Board's Artistin-Residence Program. Because of this funding, we were able to collaborate with the respected Indigenous Educator, Barb Frazer. Knowing the attributes of one's landscape was. and remains, vital to the survival and well-being of the Buffalo culture. Transforming natural objects (barks, quills, stone, etc.) was, and is, an inherit way of life within the lineage of the ancestors. Over all, Barb's activities at the gallery sought to bring an understanding of the concept of hand-knowledge forward. She also explained how ancestral First Nations knowledge is conveyed and passed down from person to person and generation to generation through songs, stories and experiential learning. Through workshops, classes and other presentations, her activities associated us with various organizations in the community and province. We engaged the Moose Jaw Police Department, Saskatchewan Polytechnic, Wakamow Valley Authority, Wakamow Aboriginal Community Association Inc., Prairie South School Division No 210, Holy Trinity Roman Catholic Separate School Division No 22, MacKenzie Art Gallery and Phoenix Academy. During her residency, Barb also worked in conjunction the Education Coordinator, Christy Schweiger, and the First Nations and Métis Consultant for Prairie South School Division No 210, Vivian Gauvin. Together, they created educational programming which explored First Nations' issues and practices. Through this programming, individual classes and collective workshops engaged over 579 students within the community.

In 2014, our practice of collaboration also extended to the function of the Heritage Gallery. We were able to work collaboratively with Joe Wikenhauser, a young Saskatchewan historian, to develop a Hidden History Series. This developing exhibition consists of components emphasizing elements of Moose Jaw's history which have been neglected or overlooked. For example, he developed an exhibition about Dr. Lydia Gruchy who was the first woman to be an ordained minister in Canada and developed another dedicated to the history of the Moose Jaw Children's Shelter.

As always, we remain dedicated to professionalism in our administrative process, especially in regard to our funding agencies. We continued practices of prompt reporting and the successful administration of our various projects has ensured a strong reputation with these agencies. As a result, we are happy to report that our funding and support remains consistent. We are very thankful to all our funding agencies who continue to recognize and support the work we do at the Moose Jaw Museum & Art Gallery.





This exhibition gave emphasis to the history of Moose Jaw's Nursing schools. It traced the history of professional nursing in the city beginning with the Riel Rebellion of 1885, when the Sisters of the Anglican Order of St. John the Divine operated a hospital for wounded soldiers in Moose Jaw. Examining the development of the General Hospital School of Nursing which opened in 1906 and operated until the last graduating class of the Moose Jaw Union Hospital School of Nursing in 1970.

This exhibition included innumerable nursing-related artifacts from the collection of the MJM&AG many of which were recent donations by local practicing and retired nurses.

IN 2014, THERE WERE 157 PARTICIPANTS IN THE SUMMER ART & CULTURE CAMPS. 72 FINANCIALLY DISADVANTAGE CHILDREN & YOUTH IN THE COMMUNITY ATTENDED THE CAMPS AT NO COST THROUGH THE COMBINED DONATION OF PROGRAM SPONSORS: THE CITY OF MOOSE JAW, SASKCULTURE INC. AND SASKATCHEWAN LOTTERIES, THE COMMUNITY INITIATIVE FUND, STUDENT SUMMER WORKS (SSW), CANADA SUMMER JOBS, AND FRIENDLY CITY OPTIMIST CLUB OF MOOSE JAW, MOOSE JAW SUPERANNUATED TEACHERS OF SASKATCHEWAN, AND SOUTH HILL COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION.

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS

IN 2014, THERE WERE 365 STUDENTS ENROLLED IN 41 ART CLASSES.

The MJM&AG's Educational Programming fulfills the mandate of the gallery and furthers the goal of increasing access to our exhibitions and collections. It provides participants with relevant, varied and entertaining educational and social experiences that enrich cultural understanding. These classes are evaluated qualitatively and quantitatively. Evaluations are used to gauge progress towards achieving goals and for future planning. Attendance figures are kept for each class and used to assess the demand for various types of activities and their success at serving audience sectors.

In 2014, the Moose Jaw Museum & Art Gallery continued its long-standing practice of working cooperatively with various agencies throughout the Community. In the Spring, the MJM&AG worked in conjunction with Vivian Gauvin, First Nations and Métis consultant for the Prairie South School Division, and Indigenous Educator Barb Frazer in order to provide 10 classes entitled First Nations Teachings. This programming, which involved 149 students from various schools within the community, involved tours of the Heritage Gallery and hands on activities. In addition, the MJM&AG worked with the City of Moose Jaw's Police Department, teaching students about forensics and fingerprinting. This was done in relation to the exhibition Like a Falling Leaf: The 1954 Plane Collision over Moose Jaw.

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS

IN 2014, THE MJM&AG HOSTED TWO WORKSHOPS INVOLVING 21 PROFESSIONAL ARTISTS.

The MJM&AG's Educational Programming also directs its attention toward the development of professional artists within and beyond the community of Moose Jaw. In 2014, the MJM&AG provided two workshops specifically aimed at developing the work of emerging and established ceramic artists.

The first workshop, *Porcelain: Understand, Master And Challenge*, was lead by Antoinette Badenhorst, a respected potter currently residing in Saltillo, Mississippi. She drew from her 33 years of art practice as an artist and instructor, teaching participants about the history of porcelain, pitfalls and problems relating to its design and firing, studio practices with the medium, and breaking away from the traditions of the medium's use. This workshop was organized in conjunction with the Saskatoon Potters Guild.

The second workshop, *Your Self And Your Personal Creativity In Clay*, was lead by Les Manning, one of Canada's most respected ceramic artists who has given over 200 workshops in 46 countries. This former Director of Ceramics at the Banff Centre and Director of the Medalta International Artists-in-Residence in Medicine Hat, helped participants to understand how to transport their work environment to a healthy more satisfying practice, how to set and achieve goals, and how to make work from a more distinct and authentic sense of self. Participants also had an opportunity to show their work and get positive input.

Both artists gave artist talks which were retrospectives of their work. They were well-attended.

ARTIST IN RESIDENCE

IN 2014, THE MJM&AG RECEIVED FUNDING FROM THE SASKATCHEWAN ARTS BOARD'S ARTIST-IN-RESIDENCE PROGRAM

Druing 2014, Barb Frazer was an Artist-In-Residence at the Moose Jaw Museum & Art Gallery. Barb, a respected Indigenous Educator, worked in conjunction with the MJM&AG and developed various programming aimed at heightening cultural understanding of First Nations Culture.

Knowing the attributes of one's landscape was, and remains, vital to the survival and well-being of the Buffalo culture. Transforming natural objects (barks, quills, stone, etc) was, and is, an inherit way of life within the lineage of the ancestors. Over all, Barb's activity sought to bring an understanding of what this type of hand-knowledge building is and to explain how ancestral First Nations knowledge is conveyed and passdown from person to person and generation to generation through songs, stories and experiential learning.

During the residency, Barb led several workshops. She led a Cree Culture Awareness Workshop for the community. This workshop helped to raise consciousness regarding the nature and presence of First Nations culture in the city and surrounding area. It was lead in conjunction with two teachers and community members. It ended with a talking circle. She also lead a series of workshops related to *First Nations Handbuilding Practices*. These workshops, which were taught to members of the community, facilitated a hands-on knowledge regarding how to make beaded pictures frames and fringe decorated shawls.

During her residency, Barb also worked in conjunction with the Education Coordinator, Christy Schweiger, and the First Nations and Métis Consultant for Prairie South School Division No 210, Vivian Gauvin. Together, they created educational programming which explored First Nation's issues and practices. In terms of format, this included programming for individual classes involving tours of the Hertiage Gallery and hands-on components and collective groups involving films, curricular content, and hands-on activities. Over all, **579 students** attended this programming.

Throughout the residency, Barb worked with several agencies within the community. These agencies included:

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

IN 2014, THE MJM&AG HOSTED A STORAGE REORGANIZATION WORKSHOP CONDUCTED BY THE CANADIAN CONSERVATION INSTITUTE.

EDUCATION CO-ORDINATOR, CHRISTY SCHWEIGER ATTENDED A SYMPOSIUM AT THE KELOWNA ART GALLERY THAT WAS HOSTED BY THE CANADIAN ART GALLERY EDUCATORS (CAGE).

In 2014, the Moose Jaw Museum & Art Gallery hosted a *Storage Reorganization Workshop* in conjunction with the Canadian Conservation Institute organized by the Museums Association of Saskatchewan. This professional workshop was designed to help museums and galleries make a basic assessment of their collections storage area using the RE-ORG methodology in order to outline some options for improvements. The overall intention was to advance practices regarding collections management.

Part of the programming of the **Storage Reorganization Workshop** involved an assessment of the Moose Jaw Museum & Art Gallery storage and vault facilities. Suggestions were made which, in the remainder of the year were addressed by the gallery.

There were 14 people present at this event.

The opening receptions reflect the diverse interests within the community. These well-publicized events begin with a short introductory talk by various staff members at the Moose Jaw Museum & Art Gallery and typically involve guest artists. They also include ample time for an opportunity to view the exhibitions and visit with the artists.

Artist Talks allow members of the community to interact with professional artists in a direct way. The Moose Jaw Museum & Art Gallery hosts artist talks to facilitate an important means of communication between artists and the general public.



CHAIR-/TY AUCTION

Every year, the Moose Jaw Museum & Art Gallery hosts two major fundraising events. The Chair-ity Auction, which was held on October 16, 2014, auctioned chairs and chair-themed art created by local artists. This event, which is organized in conjunction with Hunger in Moose Jaw is held in order to raise operational funding for both agencies. This event is beneficial on many levels. It allows for the MJM&AG to work in conjunction with emerging and established artists in the community. In addition, it interfaces both the gallery and these artists and the social concerns of the community.

In 2012, the MJM&AG developed a very successful model for this fundraiser, taking it off premises and adding more dynamics to the event. Following this model, this year's event was held at the Wakomaw Valley Sportsman Centre. Advanced tickets are now sold for this event and this included a performance by Saskatchewan-based folk band, Midnight Roses and a finger food buffet. This event also includes a cash bar, a silent auction for crafted ceramic and centre pieces at the tables, and a penny parade for various goods and services from local businesses in the community.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2014

1. Description of Operations

Moose Jaw Art Museum Incorporated was incorporated in 1995 for the purpose of managing and operating the Moose Jaw Art Museum. Ownership of all capital assets remains with the City of Moose Jaw.

2. Comparative Figures

Some of the comparative figures have been reclassified to conform to the current year's presentation.

3. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value with the cost being determined on a first-in, first-out basis.

Investment in Capital Assets

Amortization is not recorded in accounts as all capital assets are the property of the City of Moose Jaw. As part of the corporation's operating agreement with the City of Moose Jaw, an annual contribution from the corporation's operating budget to the City's equipment reserve fund is required. This reserve is for the replacement of office and program equipment. The contribution is calculated by the City based on their established policies. In 2014, the amount contributed was \$7,872 and is recorded as an operating expense in the financial statements.

4. Short Term Investments

To better facilitate cash management, the organization holds funds for short term investments in secure deposit vehicles that provide a competitive interest rate.

Short term investments are as follows:

Tangerine Direct Savings Account \$96,572

5. Project Cost Share

The funding arrangements for several projects undertaken by Moose Jaw Art Museum Incorporated includes a cost sharing component. The Board of Directors has established a project cost share reserve in order to ensure that sufficient funds are available for the organization's commitments, to be expended as projects are completed.

6. Acquisition Fund

The Acquisition Fund Reserve is held by the City of Moose Jaw. The Moose Jaw Art Museum Incorporated is allowed to spend 80% of the interest earned in the fund on acquisitions. The current balance of the Acquisition Fund is \$95,531 as at December 31, 2014. Of this amount, \$4,480 is available for use by Moose Jaw Art Museum Incorporated.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

7. Memorial Education Fund

A motion of the Board of Moose Jaw Art Museum Incorporated established the Memorial Education Fund. Interest earned on the fund is used for educational projects and programing of the Moose Jaw Art Museum Incorporated.

8. Saskatchewan Arts Board

The amount reported in these financial statements as grant revenue from the Saskatchewan Arts Board is made up of a combination of Lottery and non-Lottery funding. This is made possible through the Partnership Agreement between the Saskatchewan Arts Board and SaskCulture Inc., which is the Trustee for the Culture Section of Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation.

Under the terms of this agreement for the applicable period, SaskCulture allocated a specified amount of Lottery funds to the Saskatchewan Arts Board as a portion of the total envelope of funds available for the program(s) through which this grant was adjudicated and approved.

9. Art Museum Shop Operations

In 1997, Moose Jaw Art Museum Incorporated assumed the operations of the Art Museum Shop. Income and expenses from the Art Museum Shop operations are shown on a separate schedule and are recorded separately on the Statement of Revenues and Expenditures.

10. Art Museum Collection

The Art and Heritage Collection has not been capitalized on the Statement of Financial Position due to the fact that ownership of these assets remains with the City of Moose Jaw. Collections purchases are recorded at cost on the Schedule of Expenses in the period in which the items are acquired. Donated items for which official tax receipts are issued are recorded as revenue and expense on the Statement of Revenues and Expenditures at the stated appraised value. Appraised values in excess of \$1,000 are established by independent professional sources.
