MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

Who would have thought a year ago that we would still be in a pandemic? Yet here we are another year later navigating our way through each wave. The Moose Jaw Museum & Art Gallery continued to adapt, to be creative and innovative, to be current and relevant through the many ebbs and flows of restrictions.

As the MJMAG adapted to more online offerings, we were able to reach broader audiences and had more visitors from around the world.

This past year, Canada was shaken to the core by the somber discovery of unmarked graves found on former residential school grounds. In response locally, a memorial of shoes representing the lost children were set up on the St. Andrew Church steps. The Museum would go on to display the memorial in the Heritage Gallery to continue to pay respect to the young lives lost and to remind us that there is much work to be done to reconcile and heal.

When some of the scheduled exhibits were delayed, the MJMAG seized the opportunity to showcase some of many acquired pieces from the Art Gallery's permanent collection. The impressive exhibit, entitled *Fire in the Belly*, displayed works of Saskatchewan women artists. This was a great example of the organization's adaptability and creativity.

Art can be used to help people understand the world around them as shown in Susan Shantz's *Confluence* exhibit uses art and science to explore the Saskatchewan water sources. The visuals and sounds helped to convey how interconnected we are to our water sources and how precious water is. Also, Belinda Harrow's exhibition, *Unsettled*, uses art to explore how colonialism has impacted the land, Indigenous peoples and native species of animals.

Even in these unprecedented times, the MJMAG's contribution and excellence did not go unnoticed in its 55th year of operation. It was the recipient of the Leadership in the Arts – Institution award for 2021 from SK Arts. So, along with the other Board members and myself, I would like to thank Jennifer McRorie for her professionalism and for her caring, tireless, adept leadership. I would like to thank the staff for their continued hard work and dedication. I would like to wish Vivian Barber all the best in her retirement and thank her for her expertise, dedication and commitment as preparator throughout the years. Finally, I would like to welcome Rob Bos as he assumes the preparator's role.

On behalf of the Board, I would like to thank all our supporters which includes our volunteers, our partners, our donors and funders, the City of Moose Jaw, and our community. It is reassuring to know that we are supported and your loyalty is valued.

Finally, I would like to thank the Board of Directors, once again, for their ongoing interest, input, dedication, and patience through another challenging year. We have had to continue to meet more frequently to stay on top of the ongoing changes that continued to affect the operation and work of the museum. Because of this, the MJMAG was able to deliver first rate exhibitions and classes while keeping everyone healthy and safe.

It has been an honour to have served on the Moose Jaw Museum and Art Gallery Board. I consider it an absolute privilege to be associated with this organization. As I step back as the Board Chair, I will continue to enjoy all that the MJMAG has to offer and I hope you join the many programs, exhibits and classes alongside me!

DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

2021 presented as another year of challenges, being year two of operating within a global pandemic, but it was also a year of celebrations, being the 55th anniversary of when we were first incorporated. It was also the year that our organization was awarded the SK Arts Leadership in the Arts Award for organizations, a wonderful show of support and acknowledgement for the legacy and strength of our programming. Thank you to Kim Houghtaling, former Director/Curator of the Art Gallery of Swift Current, who secretly nominated us.

Our exhibition programming has had to adapt and change extensively over the last two years during the pandemic. With the possibility of shutdowns looming or surges in case numbers, exhibitions were postponed to ensure safety for artists, our staff and audiences, rescheduled in following years with the hope that we might not have the same challenges going forward to install, present and program artists' work. With our winter/spring exhibit for 2021 postponed until 2022, this opening in our schedule allowed us to not only be creative in developing a new exhibition but be responsive to topical issues within the broader social sphere. With the equity of culturally diverse groups, including the representation of BIPOC artists, being an issue that is front and centre, we conceived of the idea to showcase the diversity that is represented in our permanent collection. Specifically we focused on the work of women artists from Indigenous, settler, newcomer, culturally diverse and LGBTQ2SIA+ communities, to address gender equity as well as cultural equity. The result was the exhibition Fire in the Belly, showcasing the innovation and ambition of Saskatchewan women artists, being driven by experimentation, a sense of discovery, and political expression, within a diversity of contemporary and traditional art forms.

In 2021, our curatorial programming of in-house and touring exhibitions reflected the diversity we strive to present through:

Supporting the fibre works of emerging, newcomer artist, Hanna Yokozawa-Farquharson, in the in-house exhibition, *Wholeness*, and touring exhibition, *Calling*;
Presenting the work of SK and Canadian Indigenous artists, Joi Arcand, Catherine Blackburn and Audrey Dreaver, in the touring exhibition,
Δ Φ ΛΟυ·Δ·Δ σ C ^j ·: *I do not have my words*, which explores Indigenous

language loss to province-wide audiences;
Presenting the work of esteemed Canadian artists: Diana Thorneycroft's macabre and yet spectacular installation of *Herd* and David Milne's historic paintings and

prints;
Reaching national audiences with SK artist, Marsha Kennedy's touring retrospective, *Embodied Ecologies*, that explores the feminist theory and environmental consciousness that has driven her practice;

• Providing access to our permanent collection in *Fire in the Belly* and *Famous Last Words*, which showcased prints and poems of American artists, John Chamberlain and Robert Creeley, in partnership with the Saskatchewan Festival of Words.

We strive to be relevant to the diverse communities we serve, selecting and developing exhibitions and programs that will engage community groups in meaningful experiences. Targeted audiences shifted during the pandemic in response to expressed community need. Groups that reached out to us for online programming to help overcome isolation and create a sense of community through the arts included seniors, people with learning differences and special needs, newcomer children and youth, and the Indigenous community. Connections with target groups is often done through partnerships with other community organizations, allowing us to broaden our outreach in accessing their audiences and members, which addresses strategic objectives of developing partnerships, expanding outreach and increasing our visibility and profile. These partnerships included: the Seniors Centre Without Walls (SCWW) for seniors' phone-in art classes; Inclusion Saskatchewan, This is M3 and Moose Jaw Families for Change on CREATEabilities programming for children/youth and adults with neurodiversity/special needs; Multicultural Council on subsidized summer art camp week-long programs for newcomer children/youth; Wakamow Aboriginal Community Association (WACA) on programming for National Day for Truth and Reconciliation; and the Moose Jaw Cultural Centre on co-presenting the exhibition, م أنا م ص النك م م ح ن ا do not have my words.



2021 also saw a continuation of social media strategies, virtual exhibitions and YouTube videos of artist and community presentations, all offered as a means of enhancing our online presence and developing online audiences. Virtual exhibition tours have proved to be an innovative means of engaging children and youth and community groups.

I'd like to thank to our Board of Directors who provide leadership for our organization through their vision and dedication. Thank you to our staff – Ross Melanson, Vincent Houghtaling, Rob Bos, Vivian Barber, Christy Schweiger, Jared Boechler (term position), Linda Zakreski and Shania Morrison Baraniecki - who are hardworking, dedicated, passionate and talented individuals. A special thank you goes out to Ross Melanson for all his hard work on preparing the financials for the audit and to Vincent Houghtaling, our Administrative Assistant, who compiled and designed this Annual Report. A great big thank you also goes out to all the valuable MJM&AG volunteers that contribute both their time and talents in the many areas of service.

Another special thank you goes out to Vivian Barber, who served as our Preparator for over 23 years, starting with the organization in 1998 and retiring in December 2021. Vivian, in her role, contributed greatly to the professionalism of the art museum and the high quality of the programming offered here. Her dedication to MJM&AG and her obvious love for the collection was apparent in how she approached her position every day on the job - with professionalism, expertise and great care. Rob Bos joined us in November as the new Preparator and has already become a highly valued member of the team.

Thank you to all our funders, as noted on the final pages of our Annual Report, who continue to recognize and support the work we do at the MJM&AG. We also want to acknowledge the support of our membership and community members. None of this would have been possible without funding and public support for the institution and its programs.



Featuring a diverse selection of works from the Moose Jaw Museum & Art Gallery Permanent Collection, including painting, ceramics, beaded works, fibre art, photography, sculpture, printmaking, video and installation art, this exhibition highlights the strength and compelling nature of the work of women artists in Saskatchewan. Fire in the Belly refers to the passion, drive and tenacity that artists need to establish and sustain careers in the arts... and this is especially true of women artists. Survey exhibitions of the work of women artists has been an initiative of many art institutions over the last few decades to raise the profiles of women artists, recognize the significance of women's artistic achievements and address gender inequities in terms of women's representation in the arts. The fact that this remains relevant in 2021 shows that gender equity or equality in the arts is still not a reality.

Spanning Saskatchewan's art history from the 1960s to the present in contemporary art, this survey of the work of women artists in the province, as represented in our permanent collection, not only presents the diversity of Saskatchewan artistic practice, but also reflects diversity in terms of the artists presented, including women from Indigenous, settler, newcomer, culturally diverse and LGBTQ2+ communities.

HANNA YOKOZAWA FARQUHARSON: Wholeness MAY 28 TO AUGUST 15, 2021

Wholeness presents the beautifully minimal fibre art works of emerging Saskatchewan artist, Hanna Yokozawa Farguharson. The exhibition features two different bodies of work, Calling and Gaia Symphony, with each series drawing on her Japanese culture, her family memories and the landscapes of her new home in Saskatchewan. In the series, Calling, Hanna's works reference the natural world to speak to the interdependence of all lifeforms. The elegance and simplicity of form and an embrace of texture and chance in the works speak to the Japanese concept of wabi sabi, finding the beauty in imperfection. In the series Gaia Symphony, Hanna responds to the works of renowned Saskatchewan-born, abstract artist, Agnes Martin, by using fabrics from traditional kimonos, connecting to art history while referencing her culture and familial histories. Both bodies of works, through their quiet and poetic beauty, present the artist's exploration of the wonder of life in all its interconnectedness and vet it reflects an acceptance of its impermanence, recognizing that only by embracing its fleeting nature can we truly come to embrace life with harmony and wholeness.

DIANA THORNEYCROFT: Herd MAY 28 TO AUGUST 15, 2021

This installation by Winnipeg-based artist Diana Thorneycroft depicts a herd of more than one hundred and fifty horses traveling up a slope, half of them being transformed or metamorphosed into fierce, mythological creatures to a state of complete "otherness". Thorneycroft acknowledges, "In the past, I have used animal carcasses and dolls to parallel the human form. With this new work, I chose the ubiquitous plastic toy horses made by companies such as Breyer and Mattel". Only here, she brings new meanings through transformation and context that transcend normative and move toward the dream-like world of mythology, fairytales and the imaginary – of storytelling from the less travelled world of the subconscious.

FAMOUS LAST WORDS:

A collaborative series of prints and poems by artist John Chamberlain and poet Robert Creeley

MAY 28 TO AUGUST 15, 2021

This exhibition features a series of prints and poems that resulted out of a collaboration between American artist, John Chamberlain, and American poet, Robert Creeley, who shared a lifelong bond and friendship. In 1988, the two minds collaborated to produce a portfolio of lithographs and poems entitled, Famous Last Words, that would commemorate in printed form their mutual admiration.

BLAZES ALONG THE TRAIL: Exploring David Milne's Imaginative Vision SEPTEMBER 27, 2021 TO JANUARY 2, 2022

Milne's significance as an early twentieth century Canadian modernist artist rests on his focused and deeply personal artmaking strategies informed by an innovative aesthetic and stylistic approach. His vision differed markedly from the artistic intentions and ideological positioning of the landscape art of the Group of Seven whose works were perceived to be in alignment with a nation-building narrative which gained prominence in Canada following the First World War. The selection of Milne's works featured in this exhibition reveals the range of David Milne's inspiration in exploring media which supported his painting while also fostering new considerations in his approach to his art-making.

BELINDA HARROW: Unsettled SEPTEMBER 27, 2021 TO JANUARY 2, 2022


Over the last ten years, animals have had a strong presence in Belinda Harrow's artistic practice. She is particularly interested in that precarious area where human and animal habitats overlap. As our human populations grow and spread, animal species are forced to adapt and change, creating disruptions in migratory patterns, feeding habits and even mating behaviours. Featuring drawing, painting and sculpture, the exhibition Unsettled focuses specifically on the animals that live in and around Regina, situating them within some of the city's most recognizable landscapes. The positioning of these resourceful, native animal species within these urban environments provide us an opportunity to examine the current postcolonial world that we share, reflect on the impacts of colonialism and consider what the future might bring for us all.





VIRTUAL EXHIBITIONS & TOURS


MJM&AG continued with offering virtual exhibitions in 2021, allowing viewers virtual access to exhibitions on our website. These virtual Matterport exhibitions were created by Queen City 3D.

Virtual access to our exhibitions not only provides access to exhibitions during these unprecedented times when people may not be inclined to see exhibits in person, but it also allows for broader access to our programming beyond our community and region, and the time-limited display of physical exhibitions.

Virtual exhibition tours are an innovative means of engaging children/youth and target audiences in our exhibitions. Facilitated by our Education Coordinator remotely through classroom smartboard technology on Zoom, she guides students through the virtual gallery space, selecting artworks to discuss in detail and then facilitates a hands-on activity in response to the exhibition, having provided art kits to classrooms.

MOOSE JAW ART GUILD Looking Out My Window

NOVEMBER 12-JANUARY 9

This exhibition featured recent works by the members of the Moose Jaw Art Guild, reflecting on the impact of COVID-19. The Moose Jaw Art Guild exhibition is the longest-running continual annual exhibition at the MJM&AG. Every year, this exhibition brings together the emerging and professional artists of the community with the public, to celebrate the practice of making art in the community of Moose Jaw.

IN-PERSON EVENTS



GUIDED MEDITATION:

In response to Hanna Yokozawa Farquharson's exhibition, Wholeness, Sandra Topinka led a guided meditation with Tibetan singing bowls. Twenty participants were invited to sit in chairs or on the floor and have a relaxing experience among the artworks.



NATIONAL DAY FOR TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION:

In 2021, the Government of Canada established Orange Shirt Day as a federal statutory holiday, the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. To mark the occasion, MJM&AG hosted a Zoom event with Cassidy and Kayleigh Olson to discuss the Lost Children of the Residential School System exhibit. We also partnered with Wakamow Aboriginal Community Association on their Orange Shirt Garden community art project in Crescent Park.





Lost Children of the Residential School System: The Memorial at St. Andrew's United Church

This exhibit presents a selection of the hundreds of pairs of shoes that accumulated on the steps of St. Andrews United Church in Moose Jaw, SK, from May 30th to June 7th, 2021. The memorial was initiated by local Indigenous sisters, Cassidy and Kayleigh Olson, to honour the lives of 215 children of the Tk'emlups te Secwépemc First Nation, whose remains were found buried at the former site of the Kamloops Indian Residential School in Kamloops, BC.

Similar displays of memorial have taken place across the country. We hope that this presentation of the memorial at St. Andrew's United Church will open space for listening and learning about the truth of Indigenous experience in Canada, contributing towards discussion and reflection on Canadian accountability, for the trauma and atrocities of its colonialist systems, and commitment to making real change towards Truth and Reconciliation in support of the healing of Indigenous people across the nation for the benefit of our future generations.

Marsha Kennedy: Embodied Ecologies

Embodied Ecologies presents a retrospective survey of the compelling, poetic, political and hauntingly beautiful work of Saskatchewan artist, Marsha Kennedy. Drawn from twenty-five public and private collections throughout Western Canada, this exhibition explores the conceptual basis and evolution of Kennedy's art practice through multiple bodies of work that engage in concepts pertaining to the body, motherhood, feminism, spirituality, nature, museology, ecology, environmental sustainability, and colonial impacts on the land, spanning the course of Kennedy's impressive and prolific four decade career. This survey brings together over one hundred works in printmaking, painting, mixed media, installation and sculpture to present a richly layered picture of the diversity and yet unifying conceptual threads of Kennedy's practice.

This exhibition began its tour of Western Canada by first visiting the Art Gallery of Swift Current, and subsequently going to the Vernon Public Art Gallery in Vernon, BC. The tour schedule will continue at the Estevan Art Gallery & Museum, April 8 - May 28, 2022.

Originating from Japan, where she worked in digital architecture and landscaping design with a focus on stonework, the artist's works draw upon the aesthetic and design principles of her cultural and professional background, while responding to the natural landscapes and experiences of her new home as a newcomer to Saskatchewan.

This exhibition features the paintings, sculptures and craft objects of folk artist, Frank Cicansky, in dialogue with the ceramics and sculptural work of his son, internationally renowned artist, Victor Cicansky. The presentation of these artists' works together offers an opportunity to consider the shared values, creative drives and narratives of memory, place and origin that inform both of their artistic practices. Together these works reflect a sincere and compelling response to place, offering immigrant narratives of first and second generation settler Canadians in southern Saskatchewan, while also exploring the influential connections between our province's folk art and funk art genres.

A PRAIRIE VERNACULAR: Folk and Contemporary Art Narratives of Life on the Canadian Prairies

The exhibition, *A Prairie Vernacular*, examines historic and contemporary representations of the vernacular in artistic practice on the Canadian prairies. These representations of the vernacular not only adopt the materials, methods and/or motivations of a folk aesthetic, but speak to shared contexts and subject matter, either reflecting on memories and histories of life on the prairies or presenting visual narratives rife with humour, fantasy, myth, politics, religion, and the prairie gothic. The relationship between folk or vernacular art and contemporary art on the prairies has been complex and, perhaps, somewhat symbiotic, stemming from a shared interest in prairie experience, culture, environment and sensibilities as compelling sources for artistic practice.

This exhibition completed its tour with stops at the Art Gallery of Southwestern Manitoba in Brandon, MB and the Red Deer Museum + Art Gallery in Red Deer, AB.







SCHOOL TOURS

IN 2021, THE MJM&AG DELIVERED 88 SCHOOL PROGRAMS ATTENDED BY 1872 STUDENTS.



School programming continued fully online in 2021, but rebounded considerably compared to 2020 numbers. Education Coordinator Christy Schweiger created opportunities for virtual exhibition tours and remote handson activities, using Zoom and our virtual exhibitions to connect with school classes and engage in discussion about art and history. Hands-on activities were facilitated through providing activity kits to classrooms prior to the online programs, where Schweiger provided remote guidance to various art projects in response to exhibitions.

ART & CULTURE CAMPS

IN 2021, THERE WERE 124 PARTICIPANTS IN THE SUMMER ART & CULTURE CAMPS. 62 FINANCIALLY DISADVANTAGED CHILDREN & YOUTH IN THE COMMUNITY ATTENDED THE CAMPS AT NO COST THROUGH THE COMBINED DONATION OF PROGRAM SPONSORS.

In 2021, one of the challenges faced by the MJM&AG was how to continue providing Summer Art & Culture Camps programming in a safe and accessible manner. For this summer we were able to shift our summer programming into a hybrid model that students could participate in either on site or from home depending on preferences and risk factors.

By providing opportunities to explore ideas and engage in creative activities, these classes and workshops advanced the participants' quality of life, allowing children to connect and engage with others through art.

A portion of the participants in the program were sponsored, providing classes at no cost. Summer programs were delivered by Education Coordinator Christy Schweiger as well as Karigan Diggins and Cora Melanson.

ART PROGRAMS

IN 2021, THERE WERE 182 STUDENTS ENROLLED IN 23 ART CLASSES. CLASS SIZES WERE LIMITED TO 6 IN-PERSON PARTICIPANTS PER CLASS TO ENSURE SAFE WORKING ENVIRONMENTS.

The MJM&AG's mandate is to guide the structure and content of Educational Programming. While doing so, every attempt is made to provide participants with creative and social experiences that will be varied, engaging, and relevant. These classes are evaluated qualitatively and quantitatively in order to gauge progress in relation to achieving goals. The subsequent assessments of this data directs future planning for success. Attendance figures are kept for each class and are another method of assessing relevance and interest.

Over the course of the year we used a variety of safe delivery models for our classes. We offered classes fully online for remote learning through Zoom, we offered in-person physically-distanced classes with a limit of 6 participants, and we offered a hybrid model where participants could choose either option.



IN 2021, THE MOFFAT FAMILY FUND AND THE CITY OF MOOSE JAW COMMUNITY GRANT PROVIDED FUNDING FOR 347 STUDENTS TO ATTEND OUR 26 CREATEABILITIES CLASSES FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH LEARNING DIFFERENCES.





Every year, MJM&AG offers our *Create*ABILITIES program - art classes for individuals with special needs and learning differences. *Create*ABILITIES continued to grow and thrive in 2021.

We were able to deliver 9 more classes to 149 more students than last year, and strengthen our partnerships with a number of community organizations in the process. 

FESTIVAL OF WORDS:


Our partnership continued for another online year of the Saskatchewan Festival of Words. This year our contribution was an exhibition from the MJM&AG Permanent Collection, *Famous Last Words*: A collaborative series of prints and poems by artist John Chamberlain and poet Robert Creeley. The exhibition was open to the public and available online during the festival.



MJM&AG Artbook Club:

2021 saw the return of the Moose Jaw Museum & Art Gallery Artbook Club. As a community outreach program, it provides engaging and inspiring conversation focused on an important element or figure within art history and contemporary art.

This year, to complement *Fire in the Belly*, we held two sessions discussing different sections of Mary Gabriel's book *Ninth Street Women: Lee Krasner, Elaine de Kooning, Grace Hartigan, Joan Mitchell, and Helen Frankenthaler: Five painters and the Movement That Changed Modern Art.* This book discusses a group of women that entered the world of abstract painting in the postwar United States.





CLAY AT HOME KITS:

In 2021 we continued to offer Clay at Home kits for the community that outline a simple clay project for all ages and skill levels.

The kit includes the required materials for the project and a link to a YouTube video explaining to participants the steps to complete it. The project is usually simple enough where a participant can spend $\frac{1}{2}$ -2 hours of their time on the project.

The fees are nominal to include all walks of life.

As an accessible activity that is easy and fun to do at home, and that could be done at any time, demand was high from individuals as well as schools and senior groups.

The projects introduce participants not only to materials that are not always accessible, but also to other programs and exhibitions available to them at the gallery.



SENIORS' CENTRE WITHOUT WALLS:

Our partnership with the Seniors' Centre Without Walls grew stronger in 2021. Education Coordinator Christy Schweiger delivered a series of art programs over the phone to senior citizens around the province who want to engage in the arts to overcome isolation and feel part of a community. Participants work through the different steps of making the project and have a chance to chat at the same time. These activities reached 405 participants in 2021.

Participants were located throughout the province, including the communities of Assiniboia, Meadow Lake, Moose Jaw, Mossbank, Regina, and Saskatoon.


This year also included the special program "A Taste of Art", presented in collaboration with Winnipeg-based dementia educator Catherine Livingstone using elder engagement strategies developed by the University of Wisconsin, Milwaukee.

Images were chosen from *Blazes Along the Trail: Exploring David Milne's Imaginative Vision*. Participants received kits containing art supplies as well as accompanying reproductions of Milne's works to discuss using creative and open-ended prompts.

The kits and program were provided free of charge to participants.

Some statements from satisfied participants:

"I am mostly home bound lately so the art program on Thursday mornings has become an hour that I really look forward to. It is my time to socialize, challenge my artistic abilities, have a lot of fun, and relax. My mom enjoys what I have been making in the group, just the other day she said she was surprised how well I could draw. I plan to join in a few of the other programs once I get the hang of it. 

TREE REJUVENATION PROJECT

THREE NEW WORKS WERE CREATED FROM DECOMMISSIONED TREES IN CRESCENT PARK

As time passes, trees in Crescent Park outside MJM&AG become unstable and dangerous for park visitors. This has led to an ongoing project where MJM&AG, in partnership with the City of Moose Jaw and Crescent Park Foundation, commissions local artists to give these trees new life as wooden sculptures.

Using a thorough process, the partners selected artists to create three such works in 2021:

Karen Watson of Moose Jaw carved a tribute to Moose Jaw's famous Band and Choral Festival.

Dustin Stearns of Moose Jaw carved a red-tailed hawk.

Kamron Garbe of Regina carved a Great Blue Heron emerging from wheat.

In July we played host to a Québec-based family reality competition show. UnisTV's "À Fond de Train" sees parent-child teams riding the train to various Canadian cities serviced by the railway. At each stopping point, two teams perform a series of challenges to win the *billet d'or* for that location. The winner continues to the next episode, while the loser is out and is replaced by a new team.

Season 5, episode 5 took place in Moose Jaw and visited a variety of locations in the city, including MJM&AG. NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2021

1. DESCRIPTION OF OPERATIONS

Moose Jaw Art Museum Incorporated was incorporated in 1995 for the purpose of managing and operating the Moose Jaw Art Museum. Ownership of all capital assets remains with the City of Moose Jaw.

2. COMPARATIVE FIGURES

Some of the comparative figures have been reclassified to conform to the current year's presentation.

3. COVID-19

The Saskatchewan Government declared a Public Health State of Emergency on March 20, 2020.

COVID-19 pandemic emergency measures have caused changes to the organization's activities. The organization continues to operate within federal and provincial guidelines. The emergency measures affect both client and staff interactions. The economic influence will not be fully known until the measures are lifted and the ongoing processes and procedures are known. The organization is pursuing applicable program benefits to mitigate the economic impact.

4. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash includes cash and cash equivalents. Cash equivalents are short term investments and are valued at cost. The carrying amounts approximate fair value because they have maturities at the date of purchase of less than ninety days.

Contributed services

The operations of the organization depend on both the contribution of time by volunteers and donated materials from various sources. The fair value of donated materials and services cannot be reasonably determined and are therefore not reflected in these financial statements.

Goods and Services Tax

Contributed materials and services are recoverable at 50% as a

rebate. The unrecoverable portion is recorded as an expense with the rebate treated as a receivable.

Net assets

1. Unrestricted net assets comprise the excess of revenue over expenses accumulated by the organization each year, net of transfers, and are available for general purposes.

Revenue recognition

Moose Jaw Art Museum Incorporated follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions.

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Restricted investment income is recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted investment income is recognized as revenue when earned.

<u>Inventory</u>

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value with the cost being determined on a first-in, first-out basis.

Investment in capital assets

Amortization is not recorded in accounts as all capital assests are the property of the City of Moose Jaw. As part of the corporation's operating agreement with the City of Moose Jaw, an annual contribution from the corporation's operating budget to the City's equipment reserve fund is required. This reserve is for the replacement of office and program equipment. The contribution is calculated by the City based on their established policies. In 2021, the amount contributed was \$8,114 and is recorded as an operating expense in the financial statements.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

5. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The company is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments and has a comprehensive risk management framework to monitor, evaluate and manage these risks. The following analysis provides information about the company's risk exposure and concentration as of December 31, 2021.

(a) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that an entity will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The company is exposed to this risk mainly in respect of its receipt of funds from its funders and other related sources and accounts payable.

Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the company is not exposed to significant other price risks arising from these financial instruments.

6. PROJECT COST SHARE

The funding arrangements for several projects undertaken by Moose Jaw Art Museum Incorporated include a cost sharing component. The Board of Directors has established a project cost share reserve in order to ensure that sufficient funds are available for the organization's commitments, to be expended as projects are completed.

7. FUTURE PROGRAMMING RESERVE

The organization pursued applicable program benefits to mitigate the economic impact of COVID-19 during the year. As the pandemic is ongoing, the Board of Directors established a Future Programming Reserve fund in order to sustain the ongoing economic impacts of the pandemic.

8. FAFARD ACQUISITION

The organization has committed to the purchase of a bronze sculpture "Peggy" by Joe Fafard. The organization is currently in possession of the artwork. The total cost of the acquisition is \$100,000 plus applicable taxes. The sculpture is currently valued at \$150,000.

Moose Jaw Art Museum Incorporated will be embarking on a fundraising campaign in order to finance acquisition of the artwork. It is expected that the campaign will take several years to complete.

Because ownership of The Art and Heritage Collection is vested with the City of Moose Jaw and the success of the campaign is uncertain, the liability for the remaining acquisition costs have not been recorded on these financial statements.

9. ACQUISITION FUND

The Acquisition Fund Reserve is held by the City of Moose Jaw. The Moose Jaw Art Museum Incorporated is allowed to spend 80% of the interest earned in the fund on acquisitions. The current balance of the Acquisition Fund is \$103,059 as at December 31, 2021. Of this amount, \$6,566 is available for use by Moose Jaw Art Museum Incorporated.

10. MEMORIAL EDUCATION FUND

A motion of the Board of Moose Jaw Art Museum Incorporated established the Memorial Education Fund. Interest earned on the fund is used for educational projects and programming of the Moose Jaw Art Museum Incorporated.

As at December 31, 2021 the market value of the fund is \$35,400.

The Board of Directors has approved the transfer of \$25,000 from the Memorial Education Fund to the Operating Fund in order to finance the initial installment of the purchase of the artwork "Peggy" by Joe Fafard. The initial transfer of the funding is to be repaid to the Memorial Education Fund via the fundraising campaign.

11. SK ARTS

The amount reported in these financial statements as grant revenue from SK Arts is made up of a combination of Lottery and non-Lottery funding. This is made possible through the Partnership Agreement between SK Arts and SaskCulture Inc., which is the Trustee for the Culture Section of Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation. Under the terms of this agreement for the applicable period, SaskCulture allocated a specified amount of Lottery funds to SK Arts as a portion of the total envelope of funds available for the program(s) through which this grant was adjudicated and approved.

12. ART MUSEUM SHOP OPERATIONS

Income and expenses from the Art Museum Shop operations are shown on a separate schedule and are recorded separately on the Statement of Revenues and Expenditures.

13. ART MUSEUM COLLECTION

The Art and Heritage Collection has not been capitalized on the Statement of Financial Position due to the fact that ownership of these assets remains with the City of Moose Jaw. Collections purchases are recorded at cost on the Schedule of Expenses in the period in which the items are acquired. Donated items for which official tax receipts are issued are recorded as revenue and expense on the Statement of Revenues and Expenditures at the stated appraised value. Appraised values in excess of \$1,000 are established by independent professional sources.
